t is with great sadness that we share the news that John Charity, Orthopaedic Surgeon and Lead Clinician for Hip Surgery at the Princess Elizabeth Orthopaedic Centre, Royal Devon and Exeter Hospital, Exeter, UK, passed away on 17th August 2025. He was 54.

John was born in Sao Paula, Brazil on 14th January 1971. He attended medical school at the Federal University of Sao Paulo, obtaining his MD in 1996.

He then completed residency at the Santa Casa Hospital, Sao Paulo, obtaining the Diploma of Specialist in Trauma and Orthopaedics in 2001. John had roots in the South West UK (his grandfather was a clergyman on the edge of Exmoor) and he arranged to visit the

Princess Elizabeth Orthopaedic Centre in Exeter in 2001. This visit changed the course of his career and he returned for a year's fellowship in hip surgery in 2003. John liked Exeter so much, and the team in Exeter him, that he never left.

John became a cornerstone of the department over the subsequent 23 years. He specialised in hip surgery, performing several thousand hip replacements in his career, with phenomenal results in the National Joint Registry. He also led the hip fracture service, helping to transform the quality of care for thousands of patients. Patient care was his upmost priority and he was an attentive, approachable and supportive clinician and an excellent communicator. His patients adored him.

John was also an academic, researcher, educator and mentor. He became a member of the Royal College of Surgeons in Edinburgh in 2006, obtained an MSc in Medical Statistics from the University of Cardiff in 2007 and a Master of Surgery from the University of Edinburgh in 2015, for which he was awarded the Sir Harold Styles Medal for excellence.

Much more importantly than all of this, he was the most kind, caring, modest and decent human being that you might ever wish to meet. He was a fantastic colleague, always willing to cover or support those with whom he worked.

John tragically collapsed and died whilst walking on the coast path. Our deepest condolences go to the family he so adored - his wife Paula and his beloved daughters Nicole and Natalie.

eg Elson, retired Consultant Orthopaedic Surgeon at the Northern General Hospital, Sheffield, died on the 22nd October 2025.

He was a gifted, inquisitive surgeon and was one of the first to scientifically address the challenges of revision hip arthroplasty surgery following periprosthetic joint infection.

He was born in London on 30th September 1930. Educated at East Ham Grammar School for Boys, he thought of a musical career, but an accident to his right index finger flexor tendon changed his plans. He chose medicine and read Natural Sciences at Jesus College Cambridge, followed by clinical training at The London Hospital, qualifying in 1954. His surgical and orthopaedic training was undertaken in London and Oswestry, but an interest in hip arthroplasty led him to Wrightington.

In 1967, he was appointed Consultant Orthopaedic Surgeon at the Northern General Hospital, Sheffield. His time with Charnley impressed upon him the significant benefits hip arthroplasty brought. However, the devastating complication of periprosthetic infection troubled him, so in order to learn more, he spent a year with Professor Buchholz at the EndoKlinik, Hamburg. The practises he brought back are now commonplace in many hospitals today.

In 1992, he was a founding member of the European Hip Society and President in 2000. He was President of the British Hip Society 1994 - 96.



He was also a prominent member of the International Hip Society and founder member of the European Society for Bone and Joint Infection.

Reg was the brainchild behind the creation of the Cavendish Hip Fellowship in Sheffield, that offered advanced training in primary and revision hip arthroplasty surgery.

Music remained a passion throughout his life; spending many hours playing the organ that he had built at home.

He was a warm, generous man and had a wide network of friends and colleagues across the globe.

In 1955, at The London Hospital, he met Patsy, where they were both junior doctors. They married three years later. Reg leaves Patsy, their four children John, Linda, Elizabeth and David and seven
